In our 25 years of developing healthy youth who are successful in school and make positive life choices, this is our eighth annual report. Its purpose is to provide transparency to the programs and financial activities of Boys & Girls Club of Benton County for January through December 2014 fiscal year. The club has once again been awarded a “Gold” level of transparency by Guidestar, an information service specializing in reporting on U.S. non profit companies. The Club is in the top 1% of most searched nonprofits on the GuideStar website ([www.guidestar.org](http://www.guidestar.org)).

The Club’s annual report speaks to programs offered at the Club, impact on Club members, and the resources needed to make that impact. # ACADEMIC SUCCESS

## Facts

The Average School completion rate for the six school districts served by Boys & Girls Club of Benton County is 71%. Of those Benton County children who will drop out of school, 49 will do so by 9th grade.<sup>1</sup>

36.6% of Benton County school children report a “low commitment to school.”<sup>2</sup>

The children who attend Boys & Girls Club report a school suspension before they joined the Club at a rate that is nearly two times greater than that reported by their peers.<sup>3</sup>

Academic Success is made possible through funding from the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation, General Mills, Arvest Bank, Carl & Alleen McKinney Charitable Trust, Procter & Gamble, Arkansas Arts Council, Arkansas Out of School Network, Bank of America, Money Gram, United Way of Northwest Arkansas, and the Walmart Foundation.

## 2014 Boys & Girls Club Activities in Support of Learning

We believe that when children can complete their assigned schoolwork they are less likely to fall behind and become disengaged. In 2014:

- 1,264 children were assisted to completing their assigned homework – a 54% increase over 2013
- On average each day in the after school program 93 children were assisted with homework.
- Throughout the year children completed 14,893 lessons.

Economically disadvantaged youth often experience a learning loss during the summer months when school is not in session. This is especially true in math and reading. In 2014:

- 116 economically disadvantaged children participated in the 2014 Summer Learning Camp for math & reading, 16% more than in 2013.

Research shows that children do better in school when engaged in fun “high yield” learning activities in the out of school hours. In 2014:

- 1,242 children participated in art projects and activities. On average, 73 children participated in an art activity each day
- 748 children participated in the technology program that includes everything from basic skills practice to graphic and game design. On average, 37 children participated in the technology program in each of the 245 offerings.
- 526 children participated in the Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) activities. On average, 68 participants participated in each offered STEM activity.
- Children participated in other high yield learning activities such as critical thinking games and discussion groups. On average, 855 children participated in these activities each day they were offered.
- 493 children did self-directed learning using computer assisted learning programs. On average, 69 children did self-directed learning each day.
- 17 youth completed the Diplomas2Degrees program, preparing them for postsecondary education.

## Impact

Boys & Girls Club kids report a low commitment to school at a rate of 34% less than their Benton County Peers.<sup>3</sup>

After joining Boys & Girls Club, school suspensions were reduced by 57% for those children who had previously been suspended.

99% of Boys & Girls Club kids completed their grade on time.<sup>4</sup>

64% of caregivers reported improvement in their child's school performance since joining.<sup>4</sup>

## Summer Reading & Math Camp Outcomes:

- Of all Camp reading participants, 59% showed a reading gain and no participant showed summer reading loss using the Diagnostic Reading Assessment post-test over pretest.
- Of all Camp math participants, 29% showed a math gain and 2 participants showed minor summer math loss in pre and post assessments.



# GOOD CHARACTER & CITIZENSHIP

Good Character & Citizenship is made possible by support from the Arkansas Women's Foundation, Unilever, Verizon Foundation, United Way of Northwest Arkansas, and the Walmart Foundation.

## Facts

Benton County children have high risk for early initiation and use of alcohol and drugs:

- 7.5% report being drunk or high at school. <sup>2</sup>
- 10.7% report having used an illegal drug in the past 30 days. <sup>2</sup>
- 7.3% report "binge drinking." <sup>2</sup>
- 19.7% report friends using drugs.<sup>2</sup>

Benton County kids have a need for social protections:

- 35% of Benton County kids report interacting with "antisocial peers."<sup>2</sup>
- Only two-thirds of Benton county kids report school opportunities for "pro-social involvement."<sup>2</sup>

## 2014 Boys & Girls Club Good Character & Citizenship Activities



SMART Moves is a multi-class age appropriate training where kids learn skills to resist peer pressure to be involved in antisocial behaviors. Options are also available for gender specific classes. Youth learn to set positive goals, resistance skills and techniques, and to make positive life choices. In 2014:

- 504 children participated in SMART Moves training, a 78% increase over 2013.

Torch Club (ages 11-13) and Keystone Club are leadership and service clubs that meet weekly and provide service learning leadership opportunities, positive association, and pro-social activities. In 2014:

- 125 youth were active in Torch Club service learning activities.
- 58 teens were active in Keystone Club.

In the Social Recreation program youth learn about sportsmanship and how to make and be a good friend. Youth learn and develop a variety of important social and life skills that will serve them well throughout their lives. In 2014:

- 2,138 children participated in the Social Recreation program, and increase of 12% over 2013. On average, 164 youth participated in the program each day.



## IMPACT

Kids Participating in SMART Moves showed an average seven point gain in knowledge when comparing average pre-test scores to post-test scores.

Boys & Girls Club kids avoided antisocial behaviors and developed skills to make positive choices; when compared to their peers.<sup>3</sup> Boys & Girls Club of Benton County kids report:

- Cigarette use at a rate of 18% less.
- The use of alcohol at a rate of 28% less.
- Drug uses at a rate of 20% less.

For Boy & Girls Club kids who had reported using alcohol before joining the Club, there was a reduction in use of 64% after joining the Club and a reduction in drug use of 56% after joining.

Boys & Girls Club kids had more positive associations and greater opportunities to participate in positive activities; when compared to their peers<sup>3</sup>:

- Positive peer associations at a rate of 24% greater.
- Opportunities for positive activities at a rate of 14% greater.

93% of Club kids report having the skills to make good choices.

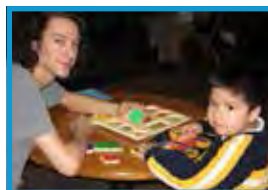
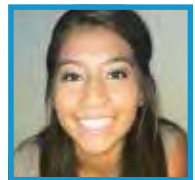


Ages 14 - 18

# HEALTHY LIFESTYLES

## FACTS

1 in 3 Arkansas public school students are overweight. Overweight children have a higher risk of developing a multitude of health problems.<sup>5</sup>

Only 35.6% of Arkansas' adolescent school children participate in any school physical education; a rate that is 24.7% below the national average of 47.3%.<sup>6</sup>

Potato chips and French fries make up 25% of the vegetables eaten by children and 30% eaten by teens.<sup>7</sup>

The Health and Fitness Program is made possible in part by the generous support of General Mills Sales, Endeavor Foundation, Procter & Gamble, United Way of Northwest Arkansas, Coca Cola and the WellPoint Foundation, and the Walmart Foundation. Dental Screenings were made possible through support of Johnson & Johnson.

## 2014 BOYS & GIRLS CLUB HEALTHY LIFESTYLES ACTIVITIES

Cooking Matters is a formal, evidence-based nutrition education course targeted at children, teens, and caregivers. In the course, participants learn how to choose and shop for healthy foods on a limited budget and how to prepare them. In 2014:

- 167 kids and caregivers completed the Cooking Matters nutrition education course

Fitness Challenges are daily exercise activities that are designed to be an age recommended moderate to vigorous level and to be of a minimum duration of 30-40 minutes. In 2014:

- 1,868 children participated in daily group fitness challenges. On average, 46 children participated in a Fitness Challenge each day.

Oral Hygiene - For the 5th year running Johnson & Johnson has worked with Boys & Girls Club to provide our children with a dental screening and Boys & Girls Club has sponsored a Cavity Free Zone dental hygiene class for children. In 2014:

- 245 children were provided with a dental screening
- 13 children complete a dental hygiene course

## IMPACT

An average increase in nutrition knowledge and skill in post test over pretest of 7 points for children, 17% for teens, and 18% for adults.

57% of Club Kids report having better skill to make positive food choices since joining the Club.

81% of parents report that their children are more active since joining the Club.

In each of the 740 Fitness Challenges held and duplicated participation of 25,487 kids participating in them at the 4 Boys & Girls Club facilities, participating youth met the recommended exercise duration level 100% of the time and met the recommended moderate to vigorous exercise intensity level 68% of the time.



# ATHLETICS

Boys & Girls Club sponsors athletic leagues as an additional opportunity for youth to gain social skills and physical fitness.

Girls Basketball is sponsored by Kellogg's.  
1,026 boys and girls played on teams in the 2014 Youth Basketball League.

# FAMILY SUPPORT & OUTREACH

Boys & Girls Club collaborates with a variety of civic and community organizations to try and meet the emerging needs of our children and their families. In 2014, the Club partnered with other Arkansas Boys & Girls Clubs to secure State funding to provide scholarships to kids from low-income families. With the Rogers Public Schools, Boys & Girls Club collaborates to provide healthy meals that meet USDA nutrition standards for our children. The Club also partners with Payless shoes to provide children with new shoes; with Pedal It Forward to provide children bicycles; and the Great Gift Exchange to provide Christmas gifts. We wish to thank the many community organizations and businesses that have provided in-kind, direct, and volunteer support for our children and their families. In 2014:

- 23,921 nutritious free meals were provided to our children
- 41,855 nutritious free snack were provided to our children
- 73 economically disadvantaged children were provided athletic scholarships
- 655 after school scholarships were provided to economically disadvantaged children
- 955 summer scholarships were provided economically disadvantaged children
- 75 shoe vouchers were distributed to families for new shoes for 60 children
- 75 Families were provided Thanksgiving holiday food baskets
- 34 economically disadvantaged children and families were provided Christmas toys, clothing, food and more
- 118 children were provided with back to school backpacks

## 2014 BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF BENTON COUNTY YOUTH OF THE YEAR

Reina is an honor roll student taking AP classes and is driven to be the first in her family to graduate high school and seek a college degree. She says - "I will go beyond and set my bar high and push myself to stay committed to school for the years to come because it is, by far, the most important thing for me to become successful in life."



Reina didn't always have this drive and positive attitude. In her extended family it is the norm for girls to drop-out of school and have children at a very young age. She says "I used to feel like I didn't have a place to go that didn't have negative social pressures. People I didn't even know were trying to tell me how to live my life or judging me. I felt like I didn't belong until my best friend, Irene, introduced me to the Boys and Girls Club of Benton County. For the first time, I felt like I belonged." She goes on to say that through the Club "I have met some of the greatest adults that I can look-up to. They have given me advice that provides me direction in my everyday life. I no longer feel lost and out of place when I'm in school; I feel I belong and can be successful. Now, when I feel peer pressure to skip class, to do drugs, or to give "it a try", I have a place where I turn to."

**COMMUNITY INVOLEMENT**

Boys & Girls Club of Benton County could not possibly achieve all of the positive results for our youth without the tireless help of Community Volunteers. Our heartfelt thanks goes-out to all of the many people in the community who have given of their time and talent to benefit our children! In 2014:

- 324 community volunteers generously gave 2,746 hours in service in the After School & Summer Programs
- 132 volunteers assisted in the Athletics Program as Head Coaches
- 240 volunteers helped out in the football program and
- 30 volunteers guided youth in the volleyball program
- 64 adults volunteered as Be Great, Graduate one-on-one youth mentors
